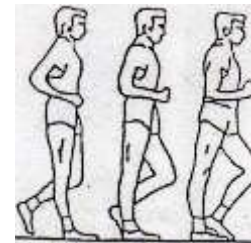

Keenly Contested Race Two

Excellent dry conditions, spring-like sunshine and an 11c temperature were ideal for a really good afternoon's sport and the number of close finishes illustrates that to have been the case. Malc Martin was never headed and Graham Chapman becoming known as 'the head waiter' bided his time before catching and passing Southern RWA President Chris Hobbs.

The women's battle was much closer, only a few seconds covering Helen Middleton and Maureen Noel. Melanie Peddle and Joyce Crawford both set pb's and Tessa Killingbeck caught the eye with a very good race walking debut. For Cath Duhig, it was probably her last race in UK for a while as she and husband Peter move to live in Spain in the next few weeks.

The race was started by Jon May, who received a warm welcome following his enforced absence from attending fixtures over the past four months, because of ophthalmic difficulties.

League tables after Two Fixtures Forty-seven walkers representing 19 clubs have turned out in the first couple of races which is a good start and the tables' show who the early pacemakers are. However, a further nine fixtures are planned so there is plenty of opportunity for athletes who have been slow off the mark, to make their presence and that of their teams felt.

Result's Round-up/Leaguers in Action Elsewhere

Malcolm and Angela Martin were in action again on the day after ERWL race 2 at LVAC, this time in the **SCVAC indoor 3km** championship. Malcolm (M60) completed a weekend double, winning in 16.23.64 and Angela (W50) won her age group with 20.17.34.

Congratulations to Tom Bosworth on setting a national indoor 5km record of 18.39.47 at the **British Athletics Indoor championships** at Sheffield on 12th February. Somewhat off the pace, the runner-up was Callum Wilkinson in 19.49.23 who was over a minute ahead of Norwegian Frank Vaeng Rotnes.

Also on Sunday 12th February at 9am, with the temperature just a single degree above zero, over 1660 athletes, among them Anne Jones started the **Worthing half marathon**. Anne walked the course in 2.30.04 and wasn't the last to finish.

Ten ERWL regulars were among the 17 athletes who took part in the **EAMA Indoor Track & Field Challenge** staged at the LVAC on Sunday 26th February. The competition involved seven area masters teams and the distance was 2km.

Helen Middleton and Melanie Peddle (both EMAC) 11.30.94 and 11.33.92 respectively, were well clear of the other five ladies in the event which included Maureen Noel (VAC) 12.23.48, Angela Martin (SVAC) 13.01.63, Fiona Bishop (VAC) 13.03.63 and Geraldine Legon (SVAC) 14.14.24.

Malcolm Martin (SVAC) 10.16.34 was a comfortable winner in the men's race. In third was John Ralph (VAC) 12.00.56 and Arthur Thomson (VAC) clocked 12.49.73.

Letter from the 1965 EO7 winner - Dr.Peter McCullagh

Dear Ron, Thank you for thinking of me and for sending the memorabilia from the 90th Enfield. It was very kind of you to think of me and it was much appreciated.

Participation in the race walking competition was one of the highlights of my 3 years in Oxford. Apart from the enjoyment of competition, race walking enabled me to visit many parts of England and to make many friendships. I have maintained regular contact with Bruce Cole and with Arthur and Bon Thomson over the intervening 50 years (it doesn't seem anywhere near that long).

I recall English race walking each evening when I consume a copper tankard (3rd place in my 1st English race, the Chippenham to Calne, 1963) of my home brew. As I wasn't equipped with wheels, I became familiar with the railway system (change at Ashby for Sheffield, I think). I also have many memories of training and racing (and often beating) the buses up Headington Hill, past Robert Maxwell's place and on out to Old Marston. I guess the Oxford buses are faster now, although the traffic up the Hill may constrain their potential.



Sunday afternoons, especially in the last year of my time at Oxford, were memorable times for training. Don Thompson would come up to Oxford and we would embark on a friendly, albeit very competitive, 20 mile circuit around Otmoor. Passing the home base of Edward the Confessor at Islip each weekend was quite special for someone brought up on British history (Australian history didn't come into its own until I'd left school and started a medical course).

One memory from my last weeks in the UK stays with me. I was returning on the train to Oxford, on this occasion, carrying the (very large) cup after the 10 miles championship. This was the time of the World Cup in England and several days before the walk, someone had pinched the Jules Rimet trophy, which was as I recall a small mounted figure and I seemed to be under intensive scrutiny from other passengers all the way to Oxford.

After returning to Australia, I continued training for several years. I managed a second in the 20 Km trial for the 1968 Games - not good enough, they only sent one. Continued training but, 4 days before the 20 miles trial for the 1970 Commonwealth Games, I came down with chicken pox - contracted from a patient whom I'd seen several weeks previously (I was supposed to have had it as a child - no such luck).

From 1970 on, my major weekend activity was, and remains, farming. At present, I have one of the last 2 remaining Elliottdale flocks on the planet (a carpet wool breed derived from a mutant Romney Marsh ram). So, when I become extinct, the breed is likely to follow me. Such is life.

Thank you again for thinking of me and all the best for Brexit and 2017 - Peter McCullagh.

The photograph taken by Ron Linstead appeared on the cover (yes the cover) of Athletics Weekly and shows Peter and myself two week after the Enfield 7, in action at the 1965 Belgrave 7, where once again he got the better of me.

ALAN FLAVELL – R.I.P.

Alan's wife of 64 years June and their son Nick were with him when he quietly passed away in hospital on 30th January this year. He had been diagnosed with Myeloma about eighteen months ago, but died as the result of an aneurysm. He was 85 years old.

Alan was born in Birmingham at the time that it was the centre of the motor engineering world and not surprisingly had a vivid interest in engineering from an early age and enjoyed a life-long association with cars and particularly motor-cycles. He served his time as a design engineer and it was whilst he was studying in Bolton for his teaching qualifications in the late sixties that I met him, and we often trained together. He went on to become a College Lecturer. After retirement Alan became a member of the Executive Guild of Master of Toastmasters and Town Criers and his services in this role was in great demand.

He would be the first to admit that his athletic career was a modest one, but could boast three London marathons, completed a Manchester to Blackpool and being a good club-man often attended walkers at ultra-distance events. Peter Emery c625 (one of the Club's 13 Centurions) recalls Alan looking after him when he successfully completed his second 100 at Congerstone, Leicester in 1982.

His last appearance for the club was in the 2014 Hour meeting at Hemel Hempstead after which he enquired about becoming a race walk judge, but I guess the onset of myeloma put paid to that.

I understand that one of his treasured memories was being at the Iffley Road track, Oxford on the historic evening of 6th May 1954 when Roger Banister ran the first sub 4 minute mile.

Rest in Peace Alan and sincere condolences to June and Nick.
